Stowe	WWII: Japanese POW died 5.1.1944, Thailand Private Walter Francis Stowe, son of Mrs E R Stowe, died of illness at Moulmein, Thailand, while a Japanese POW. A veteran of WWI he was captured in WWII during the Malaya Campaign. (Born 21.5.1901.)		
Taggart	WWII: accidentally killed 7.12.1941 at Singleton while on Leave, 36 years of age. Driver Amos Belcher Taggart, son of Mr Harry Taggart of Broke, accidentally killed when struck by a train while walking from Singleton Station to his home in Cemetery Lane; died 7.12.1941; born 24.5.1905.		
Tisdell	Alex Tisdell - Alex was the Town Band Master for 35-40 years keeping the band together when it looked like it would fold in the 1960's. He devoted a considerable amount of his time to teaching young people entering the band to play instruments as well as making sure the band was available when needed for community events. He was also President of the local Bowling Club (Club Singleton) for several years.

Warburton	William Warburton married Mary Ellen Kingston, daughter of an early Singleton miller; 1st son, William, worked for 12 yrs at James Moore & Co before leaving to work in Sydney. The 2nd son, Stanley Warburton became a solicitor after schooling at Singleton Grammar and being articled to Sir Albert Gould. The 3rd son, Kingston Ousley Warburton attended Hawkesbury Agricultural, became an auctioneer in Singleton; Kingston very involved in various organisations, particularly the NAA - president for a 12th term in 1950.		
Waring	George Waring - practised as a solicitor in Singleton for many years, and died here in 1878. Mr T G Waring and Miss Waring of Singleton are son and daughter respectively.		19
Webber	WWII: Leading Aircraftman Henry J Webber Leading Aircraftman Henry John Webber was an engine driver. He married in Singleton in 1941. Plane crashed on a routine flight in the Irish Sea. Killed 5.12.1941
