Timeline Singleton


The Hunter Valley is a coastal river basin once covered by sea in the form of a huge gulf. Over countless millions of years, layer upon layer of silt, vegetation, marine sediment and rock forming materials fill the gulf, then these layers compress, fold and weather to form the Valley.


The Hunter River emerges in the Mount Royal Range to meander a 468km journey through the Valley, with 41 tributaries joining its course along the way. Closer to the coastline, the river splits into channels creating small islands, ponds and wetlands before entering the Tasman Sea through the harbour at Newcastle.


For thousands of years, the Hunter River's life-giving waters have sustained the Wonnarua/Wanaruah People with a rich variety of plants and animals to provide food, medicines, dues, fibres and wood.


With the arrival of Europeans, the Hunter River became a roadway for commerce, exploration, and fostered agricultural industries.


The Hunter River, represented here in its many moods and seasons, connects us all. Through culture, stories, people, places and events, the River of Time gathers us all.

















About the Artist

Cover Artwork "Yarning Out, Community"

This painting portrays my interpretation of Singleton, my love of the river and the valley. A story from the beginning of Baiame to the present time.

From the mountains to the river, large grassed areas, farming, coal mining, Army and our community circles that interconnect, from traditional symbols to more modern interpretations, this painting contains them all.

Aboriginal art uses traditional symbols which can be read in many ways. Even the secret, sacred parts of a Dreaming can be painted but still remain hidden from us.

The Artist remains the keeper of secrets and the only person who will fully understand the hidden meaning.

Timeline Artworks

1. In the Dreaming

The story of Baiame, using symbols, while traditional colours echo the Baiame cave paintings at Milbrodale.

2. Deep River Dreaming

The lush green valley being nourished by the river, with her deep cool water flowing from high in the ranges down through the valley to the sea, sustaining life as she flows.

3. Valley of Plenty Bush Tucker

Wonnarua/Wanaruah People live a symbiotic existence with the plentiful wildlife and fauna of the valley.

4. Meeting Place and Community

The Sundial cornerstones the many people gathering together in the sporting fields and play spaces along the river; with vivid colours of land, sky and water.

5. Kangaroo Dreaming

Dreamtime stories are told to build knowledge and understanding of how country, animals, and people came to be. Kangaroos are plentiful along the banks of the river and feature in many Dreamtime stories.

6. In the Dreaming

The Dreamtime is eternal, time out of time, forever ending and beginning






